Kristy Weber, MD is the Abramson Family Professor in Sarcoma Care Excellence in the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery at the University of Pennsylvania. She is originally from St. Louis, Missouri and attended college at the University of Missouri-Columbia and medical school at Johns Hopkins. Dr. Weber completed her orthopaedic residency training at the University of Iowa and followed that with a two-year research/clinical fellowship in orthopaedic oncology at the Mayo Clinic. She joined the faculty at University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center, where she developed a large clinical practice in orthopaedic oncology and developed a basic science research program related to osteosarcoma metastasis to lung and renal cell carcinoma metastasis to bone. Dr. Weber was recruited to Johns Hopkins in 2003 as Chief of the Division of Orthopaedic Oncology and Director of the Sarcoma Program, and was promoted to Professor

in 2009. She received the Kappa Delta National Orthopaedic Research Award for this work in 2006. Her laboratory there was funded by OREF, NIH, and private foundations.

Dr. Weber has served on the Boards of Directors of many national orthopaedic and cancer organizations including the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons (AAOS), American Orthopaedic Association (AOA), Orthopaedic Research Society (ORS), and the Connective Tissue Oncology Society. She spent four years as Chair of the AAOS Council on Research and Quality where she oversaw initiatives related to clinical practice guidelines, evidence-based medicine, appropriate use criteria, patient safety, biomedical engineering, biological implants and the development of orthopaedic clinician-scientists. Dr. Weber has been President of the Musculoskeletal Tumor Society and the Ruth Jackson Orthopaedic Society (RJOS), Secretary of the Orthopaedic Research Society and Critical Issues Chair on the AOA Executive Committee. She has been nominated to become the first woman President of the AAOS.

Dr. Weber was recruited to the University of Pennsylvania in 2013 to serve as Vice-Chair of Faculty Affairs in the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery and Director of the Sarcoma Program in the Abramson Cancer Center. A cornerstone of the Penn Sarcoma Program is the collaborative scientific research targeted toward developing new targets for the treatment of sarcoma across Penn Medicine, Penn Veterinary Medicine and CHOP.

Jack Choueka, MD

Dr. Choueka is the Chairman of the Orthopedic Surgery and Musculoskeletal Services at Maimonides Medical Center in Brooklyn, NY. Dr. Choueka received his BS degree from Columbia University School of Engineering in Biomechanics and his MD degree from SUNY Downstate. He completed his orthopedic residency at NYU Hospital for Joint Diseases, and his fellowship in hand and upper extremity surgery at the University of Chicago Hospital.

Dr. Choueka served as the Orthopedic Residency Director at Maimonides Medical Center and was an officer for the Counsel of Orthopedic Residency Directors (CORD). He is the Past President of the Brooklyn Orthopedic Society and is currently serving as President of the New York Society for Surgery of the Hand.

Dr. Choueka has been the recipient of numerous research grants including one from the Orthopedic Research and Education Foundation OREF. He has published extensively in the field of orthopedic surgery and in hand and upper extremity surgery, and was the recipient of the Joseph H. Boyes Award from the ASSH for excellence in Hand Research.

Dr. Choueka developed the Maimonides Bone and Joint Center, a comprehensive stand-alone center for orthopedic surgery in Brooklyn. Dr. Choueka's practice is dedicated to conditions of the hand, wrist, elbow and shoulder for patients of all ages.
