Dr. Buckley completed her general surgical internship and residency at Fairview Hospital in the Cleveland Clinic System before taking her first surgical position with Shore Health in Easton, Maryland in 2007. In 2012, she began working for Anne Arundel Medical Center as an Acute Care Surgeon; subsequently she became the Medical Director of that group and the Division Chief of General Surgery.

Dr. Buckley has dedicated a significant portion of her training and professional life to organized medicine and taking a broader look at medical care delivery, with specific interests in emergency surgical care, health-care delivery to rural communities, and physician wellbeing. Through this passion, she has taken on the roll as Chief Medical Officer of CoreLife, a medical weight-loss company.
